
Figure 2.5. Asia: A Vigorous and Balanced Rebound

The normalization of global trade, a turn in the inventory cycle, and stimulussupported demand have underpinned Asia's quick recovery. Renewed capital inflows have put pressure on exchange rates, which has been absorbed mainly by further reserve accumulation.
